Antonio Soler-APÓSTOLES Y ASESINOS

Apostles and Assassins Galaxia Gutenburg, 2016. 435 pages

Filled with shoot-out scenes as chilling as The Godfather's, in this tour de force novel **Soler** recreates a turbulent Barcelona at the beginning of the 20th century, centered on the life of the charismatic gangster anarchist Salvador Seguí. In an industrial city drenched in the blood and sweat of its laborers, one man from humble origins and as handsome as a tango singer, foresees the dangers of meeting violence with violence long before his fellow workers do. Young Salvador Seguí, quickly grows frustrated with the injustices and hypocrisies of the system. Self-taught and a lover of Nietzsche, he begins attending workers' meetings and mixing with Barcelona's intellectuals in order to further his education. Eventually, he joins Catalonia's National Confederation of Labor (CNT), a Spanish confederation of anarcho-syndicalist labor unions, and becomes a major leader.. In the midst of the riots and terror, the legendary Salvador Seguí, put his life on the line fighting for their people's rights.

But when on March 10, 1923, the period's most important anarchist figure is murdered, Spanish history turns all the blacker. Based on actual events, **Soler** brilliantly depicts a society where you either kill or be killed, flee or wind up in prison, and where the brave, like Seguí are assassinated in betrayal.

Considered one of Spain's most talented living writers, Antonio Soler was born in Málaga in 1956. A fast-paced thriller set during two dark winter days of sex, drugs and espionage in New York during Madrid's 2004 train bombings.

The year is 2004. Pablo and Jorge (and Yuki, a high-end escort from Eastern Europe), board a plane for a weekend to escape a Madrid winter for the deadlier chill of a New York City one. While images of Fitzgerald and Audrey Hepburn still dance in their memories, that city is long gone. Gotham is covered in numbing snow, and namely for this duo of middle-aged men, Pablo and Jorge, longing to forget their past, this city's seedy nightlife will blanket them in the warmth of escape. It's a constant search for booze, drugs and sex. And at a touristy jazz club called Winter Blues, the music blasts loudly enough for fates to intersect, identities to blur, and vices to be satiated. Back in Madrid, the 2004 train bombings that constituted the deadliest terrorist attack in Spanish history—and among the worst in the history of Europe—will unravel before their intoxicated eyes: "Suddenly the images on Yanna's television appear to them: The explosion, the smoke, the twisted metal, the people fleeing....if only this had been only another dream within the deadweight of the anesthesia." If only the horror were only a dream.

In **Gabriel Albiac's** latest novel, he weaves a gripping tale of noir with energetic dialogue that supplies shrewd social commentary on our modern era. In an American city that is still brushing off the dust of the September 11, 2001 attacks, their lives will be threatened by the malignant force of old worlds and new worlds colliding, of modern intelligence, and old-fashioned murder.

Gabriel Albiac was born in Valencia, Spain in 1950. He received a PhD in philosophy from Universidad Complutense de Madrid, where he taught for several decades. Julio Llamazares—DISTINTAS FORMAS DE MIRAR EL AGUA

Different Ways of Looking at Water Alfaguara, 2015. 192 pages

When the eldest member of the family, Domingo, passes away, a cast of sixteen entertaining relatives are brought together for the scattering of his ashes over the northern wetlands that he was born on. On their journey there, they reconstruct their family's history, as they see it, and of their own lives as well. From the grandmother to the youngest granddaughter, memories span from the grandparent's childhood, building a life around their farm's land, until they were obligated to abandon it, after the soil is waterlogged, and a dam is built where their lives' seeds had been planted.

There are intimate stories, open family conflicts, and torn feelings from the younger members of the family as they look toward the future. The story moves in a stream of consciousness, like an existential kaleidoscope where the water's surface serves as a mirror, and where each chapter is dedicated to one character, convincingly telling us their side of the story. The different ways in which we look at water is also the different ways each of us looks at life, whether its politics, geography, history or the way we relate to the world. For some, water is a resource to be used for commercial purposes, for others, a mirror in which to look at themselves, and for others a scenic view which allows your conscience to flow.

As if turning the pages of a family album, that spans from sepia to pixelated photographs, Llamazare bestows a native's insight into the social history of the region and the inner turmoil and passions of its inhabitants...A novel about exile, about the passage of time and memory, our connection to nature, and the imprint that rural lands leave in the hearts of those who ever dwelt on them. Through a series of overlapping individual episodes, he reflects on the spiritual power of nature and the frenzy of modernization that has taken us away from not only familial lands, but from our very selves.

Internationally renowned award-winning author **Julio Llamazares** was born in Vegamián (León, Spain) in 1955. He is considered an icon of the up-market Spanish literary scene, with such emblematic works as **Luna de Lobos** and **Escenas de cine mudo**, among others. And yet his books invariably rank on best-selling lists. **Llamazares** has recently published a 25th anniversary edition of **L alluvia amarilla** (**The Yellow Rain**), a contemporary classic among Spanish students, with more than thirty reprints to date, translated all over the world.

<u>Justo Navarro—GRAN GRANADA</u> <u>Grand Granada</u> Anagrama, 2015. 256 pages.

This crime novel set in Granada during the Franco regime imagines the origins of the information society we live in today. At its center is Polo, an octogenarian police commissioner with an honorable reputation and a knack for telecommunications. A visionary, he clearly sees an Orwellian world approaching—with its invasive screens, cameras and microphones—in the not so distant future. The new page-turner by this upmarket literary award-winning author will also appeal to fans of crime fiction and detective novels.

Its ominous beginning is set on an actual historic day: "Never had that century seen so much rain, twenty hours of rain until seven in the evening: 500, 000 liters per second," as reported the press in 1963. But the flooding that ensues isn't the only destructive force alive in the city: on that dreary day, the first in a series of suicides will break out across the city. Within its provinces lives a society of highly influential men, with interconnected personal histories, and clandestine homosexual tendencies, capable of moving strings as they wish. Polo, who also belongs to Granada's upper echelons, pursues the truth behind these deaths and discovers a web of blackmail, passion and intrigue.

Though crime fiction is usually cold and impersonal, in the hands of the Granada-born author, *Gran Granada's* personal touch makes for pages upon pages of insightful and atmospheric passages. It's peppered with sixties American pop cultural references and marks the arrival of household appliances like the television and telephone. With these modern devices, human life is quickly transformed, as are the methods of murder.

In the tradition of Hammett, Jim Thompson and Chandler, **Navarro**'s stylistic ambitions and questioning of societal morals are flawlessly executed. He examines an era where wiretaps and cameras were novelties and espionage was still something physical and concrete. A technology that Polo fears will turn the police state into the police society of our chilling new world.

Antonio Soler—Una historia violenta A History of Violence Galaxia Gutenberg, 2013. 271 pages

In *A History of Violence* a young boy tries to make sense of the world around him as he discovers social status, violence, sex, fear and death. The story is told from the boy's point of view and, through **Soler**'s exquisite prose, the boy's almost innocent gaze gradually reveals his perplexity at the chaos that reigns in his own family compared to the seemingly perfect world of their more affluent neighbors, the Galianas. But, as it turns out, the Galianas are far from the model family they appear to be...

Soler explains that he came up with idea for this novel on an airplane when he suddenly recalled an incident from his childhood in which a very corpulent friend about his own age hit him on the head with a rock for no apparent reason. This image led the author to evoke the sort of relations and environment that might produce this sort of violence.

The story is simple and yet charged with symbolism. Although it is set in the 1960's in a working-class urban neighborhood on the coast of Spain, its themes; the loss of innocence, the sense of having wound up in the wrong family and being somehow unworthy compared to others, are undoubtedly universal.

Warriors and Traitors: From the War in Spain to the Cold War

In Warriors and Traitors, famed Spanish historian, novelist and journalist Jorge M. Reverte tackles the challenge of writing his first biography and does so brilliantly with this well-documented and agile account of the life and adventures of Bill Aalto.

Aalto was a hero of the Spanish Civil War who fought on the Republican side. The son of communist Finnish immigrants, Aalto was born in the Bronx (New York) and worked as a truck driver and union organizer during the Great Depression before joining the International Brigades. This charming, violent, hard-drinking, affectionate and courageous man is thought to be the inspiration behind Hemingway's *For Whom the Bell Tolls*. After his stint in Spain, Aalto was persecuted by McCarthy. He joined the OSS to fight against the Nazis under the command of the legendary William Donovan but was betrayed by his communist colleagues and repudiated for being homosexual. Aalto then travelled through Europe, hounded by the FBI, before returning to the United States where he died of leukemia, alone and impoverished.

The biography of this little-known yet historically significant character is told through the eyes of comrades such as Milton Wolff and Irving Goff, fellow soldiers such as William Donovan, and Aalto's lovers, such as the poets W.H. Auden and James Schuyler. And there is no lack of legendary writers, including Ernest Hemingway, John Dos Passos and Herbert Matthews, as well as Soviet agents and Spanish peasants.
