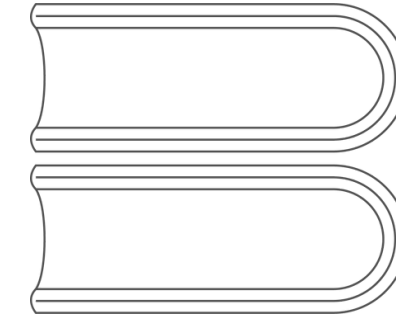

In 2016 she received the XXI Ateneo Joven de Sevilla Novel Prize for the work *El aleteo de la Mariposa* and, four years later, she received a **special mention at the VIII HQÑ International Prize** for *El excéntrico Señor Denet*. With *La Dama de la Cartuja*, she began a new chapter in her literary career, earning the **2024 Best First Novel Award** and the rights have been sold to Italy and Russia. With *The Painter of Light*, the continuation of this exciting historical saga, she is confirmed as one of the most promising names on the publishing scene in our country.

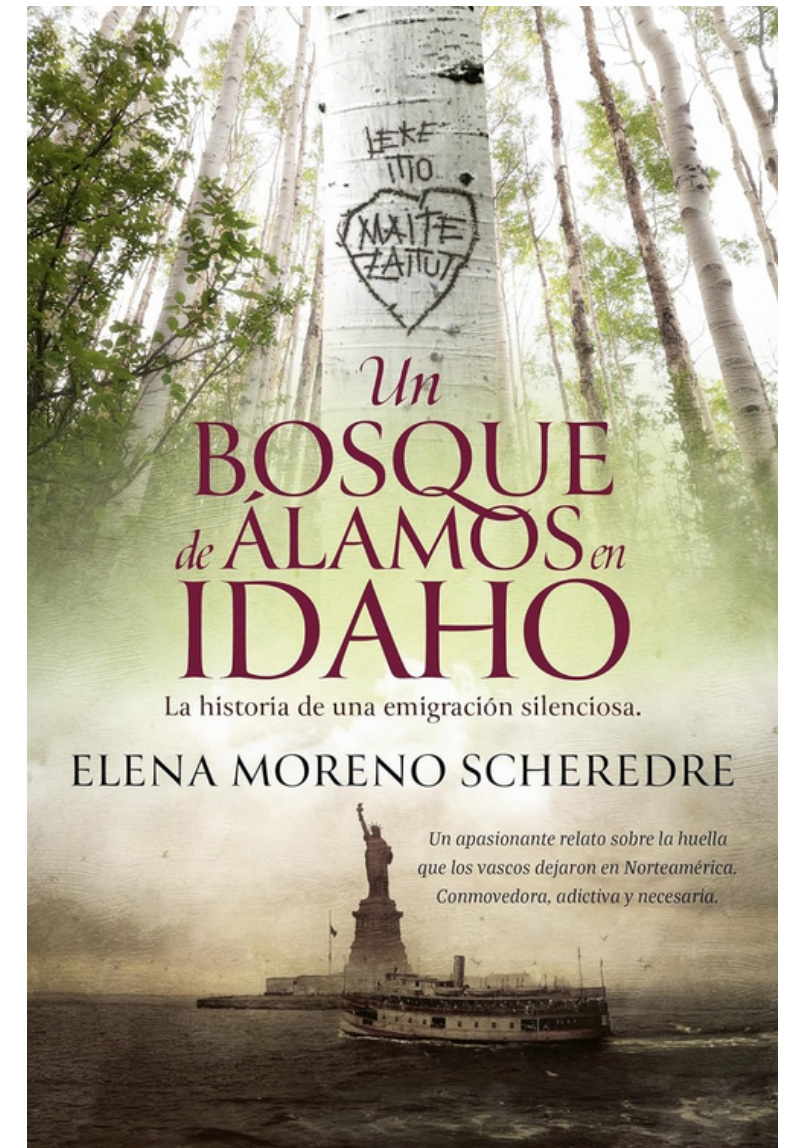
Thousands of Basques traveled from the coast of Biscay to the American West from the mid-19th century well into the 20th century. They were fleeing poverty, war, and a lack of opportunities. Almost all of them prospered through their work: the men as shepherds, and the women—forgotten by history—running inns, caring for the community, and serving as the vehicle for transmitting their culture, their roots, and their love for the land. History records the facts, but literature allows us to feel the emotions of those who lived through them.



ELENA MORENO

Elena Moreno was born in Bilbao though she has spent her life searching for the seashore. Always trying to evade her destiny as a storyteller, she found herself giving life to words through her work in radio—a medium she deeply loves—as well as in television, communications agencies, and the press. Along the way, she wrote short stories, children's tales for her own children, and taught creative writing courses, sharing the secrets of her happiness with aspiring novelists. In 2014, she received the Aixe Getxo! Literature Award, a distinction that holds special significance for her. Getxo is her place in the world.

She continues to contribute to El Correo newspaper with her columns and chronicles of everyday life. Her published works include *El salón de la embajada italiana* (2010), *Dondequiera que estés* (2013), *Devuélveme la luna* (2018), *La frontera lleva su nombre* (2022), and *Una isla para esconderte* (2024). Her most recent novel is *A Grove of Poplars in Idaho*.

It is then that she uncovers too many secrets—including one buried in her family's past capable of destroying both her and her future. In this historical novel filled with passion, mystery, and female solidarity, Clara Mendívil transports us from the narrow streets of period Madrid to the royal palace—a court teeming with secrets, where the only ones who truly hear are those who shouldn't be listening.



CLARA MENDÍVIL

Clara Mendívil is from Pamplona and studied history, although she does not work in the field. She published her first novel, *De viento y sal*, in 2019, about Anne Bonny, a famous pirate who operated in the Caribbean Sea in the 18th century. During her research, she discovered many other female pirates from different times and places, most of them largely unknown, and decided to give them a voice and tell their adventures. *Loto Rojo* is the story of one of them. She maintains a blog, www.clarasmendivil.com, where she writes, among other topics, about literature, historical novels, and the world of pirates. She published *Retrato de una corte* in 2025, a historical novel that follows Diego Velázquez's rise at the court of Philip IV while exploring political intrigue, court scandals, and the influence of the Count-Duke of Olivares in seventeenth-century Spain.

These experiments' terrible repercussions have lasted to this day. But what role did international health organizations play in these events? And who is willing to kill to prevent them from coming to light?



PALOMA RIVAS

Paloma Rivas, is a health psychologist and neuropsychologist expert in borderline personality disorder and eating disorders. She has been active in the field of mental health since 2015 and is a speaker and lecturer at Universidad Loyola de Sevilla, Colegio Oficial de Psicólogos de Andalucía, among other institutions. She collaborates in the Podcast El Tricornio Irreverente and Cómete tus miedos (Spotify) and she is an editor and lecturer at Proyecto Princesas (more than 13 thousand followers on Instagram). In 2021 Paloma Rivas published her first children's story, *Artemisa está en guerra* (Círculo Rojo), the first story in Spain that promotes the prevention of eating disorders for children. **It received the Círculo Rojo Award for the best story in the children's category.** In 2022 her second children's story was published, *A nosotros nos pintó Picasso* (Babidi-Bú), winning the X Gala Award from Editorial Babidi-Bú and the City Council of Seville. In 2024 she published her first adult novel, *Los versos sueltos del edén*, a fast-paced psychological thriller.

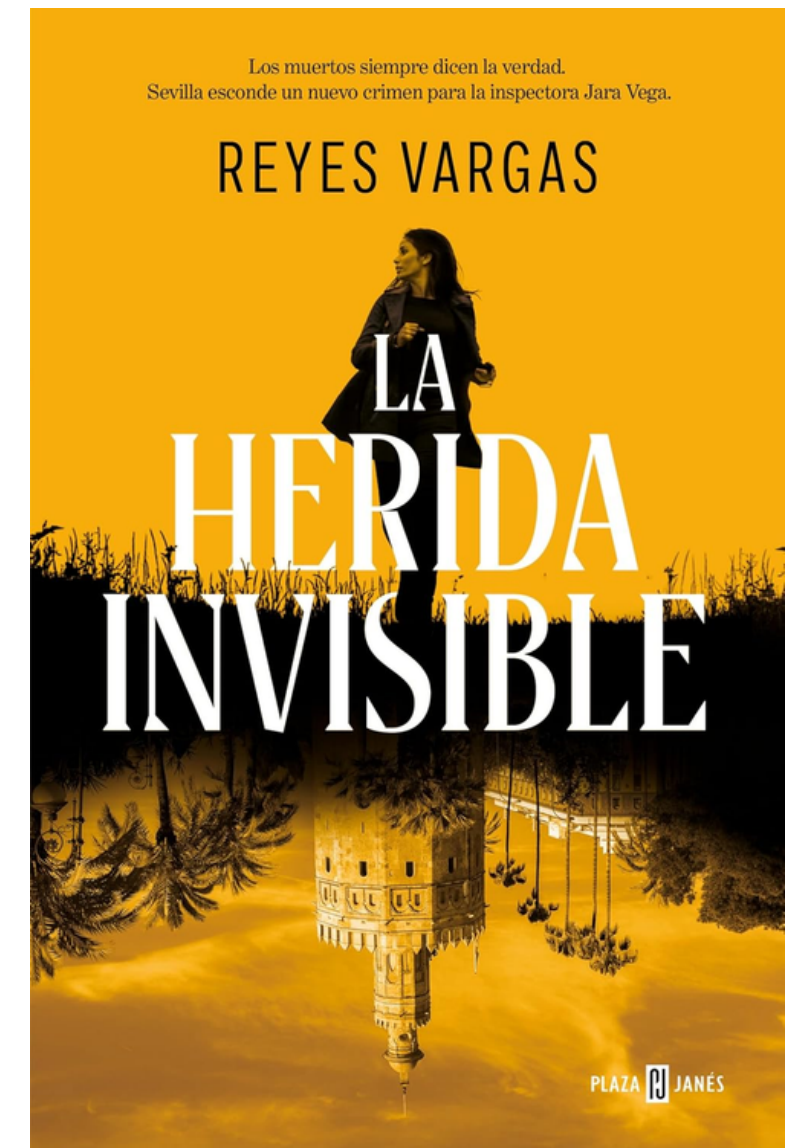

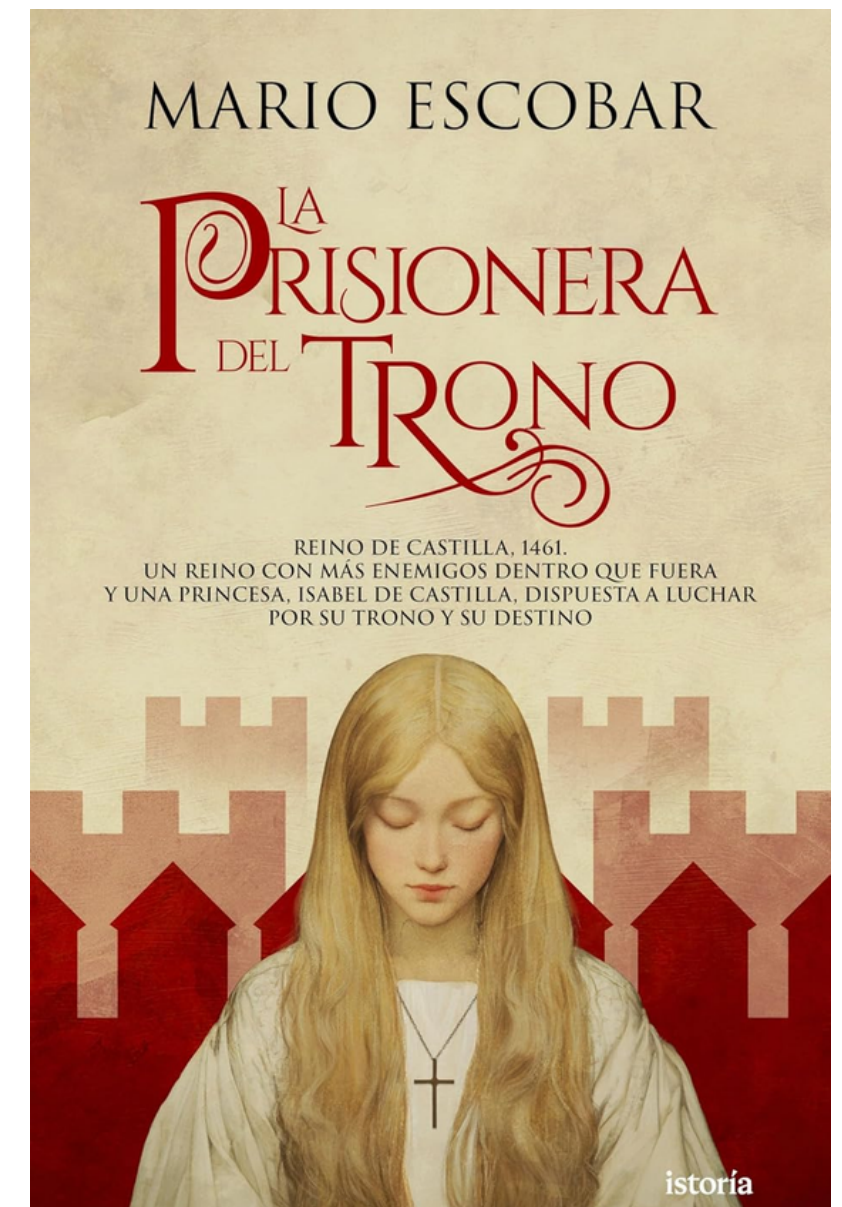

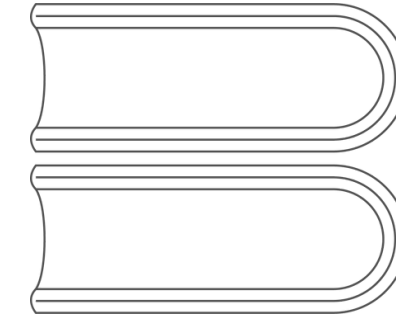


BALTASAR MAGRO

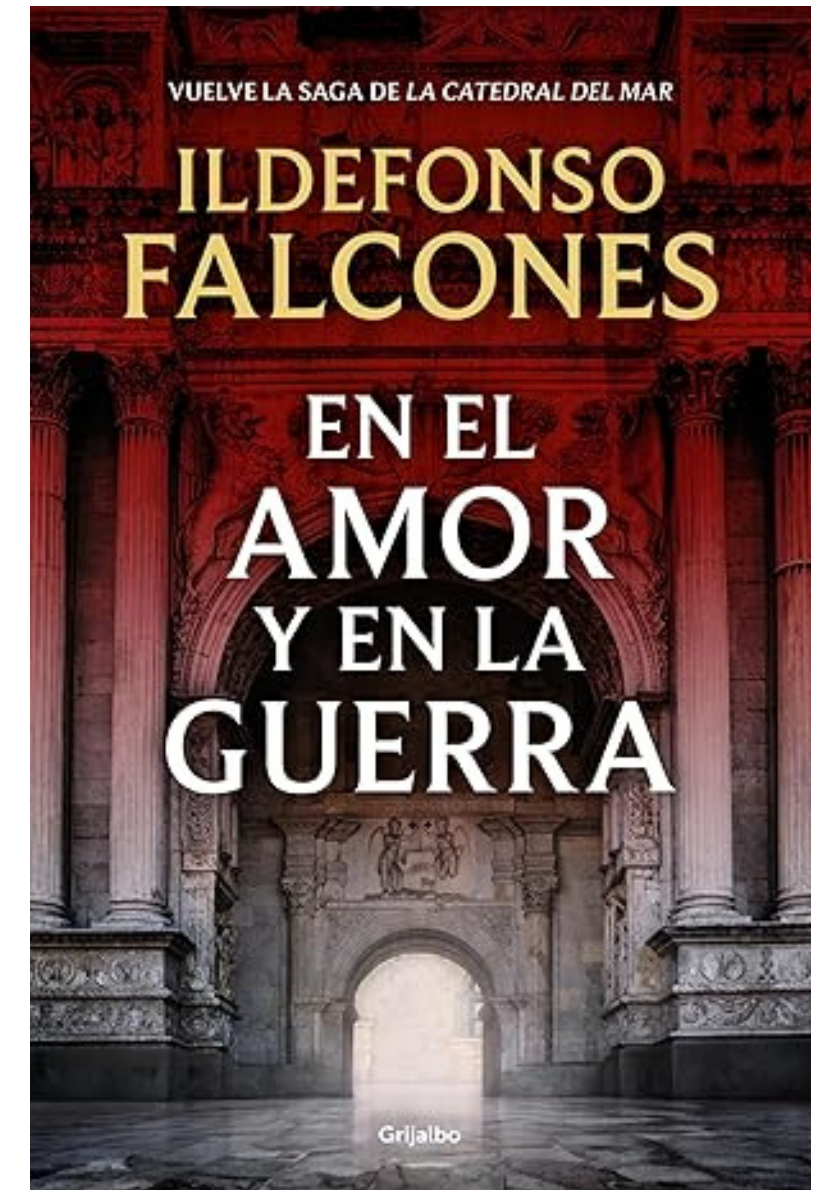

ILDEFONSO FALCONES

Ildefonso Falcones is a lawyer and writer. *La catedral del mar* (The Cathedral of the Sea), his first novel, became an **unprecedented global publishing phenomenon**, acclaimed by readers and critics alike and **published in more than forty countries**. It also won several awards, including the 2006 Euskadi de Plata for best novel in Spanish, the **José Manuel Lara Foundation award for best-selling novel** in 2006, the prestigious Italian Giovanni Boccaccio 2007 award, the Città dello Stretto 2008 international award, and the Fulbert de Chartres 2009 award. In 2018, it was turned into a successful Netflix series. His second novel, *La mano de Fátima* (Grijalbo, 2009), won the 2010 Roma Prize, and his next work, *La reina descalza* (Grijalbo, 2013), received the Pencho Cros Prize. *Los herederos de la tierra* (Grijalbo, 2016) was the eagerly awaited sequel to *La catedral del mar* and has also been turned into a series recently released on Netflix. With **more than eleven million copies of his work sold worldwide**, Ildefonso Falcones now returns, almost twenty years after the overwhelming success of *La catedral del mar*, with the third installment of the most widely read saga of our time: *En el amor y en la guerra*.

In 1799, Francisco de Goya published *Los Caprichos*, a collection of 80 extraordinary prints that denounce the flaws of Spanish society and defend Enlightenment ideals. Goya was a highly respected figure, close to kings and ministers, yet he chose to risk everything for his convictions, challenging power and the Old Regime at a time of great unrest.

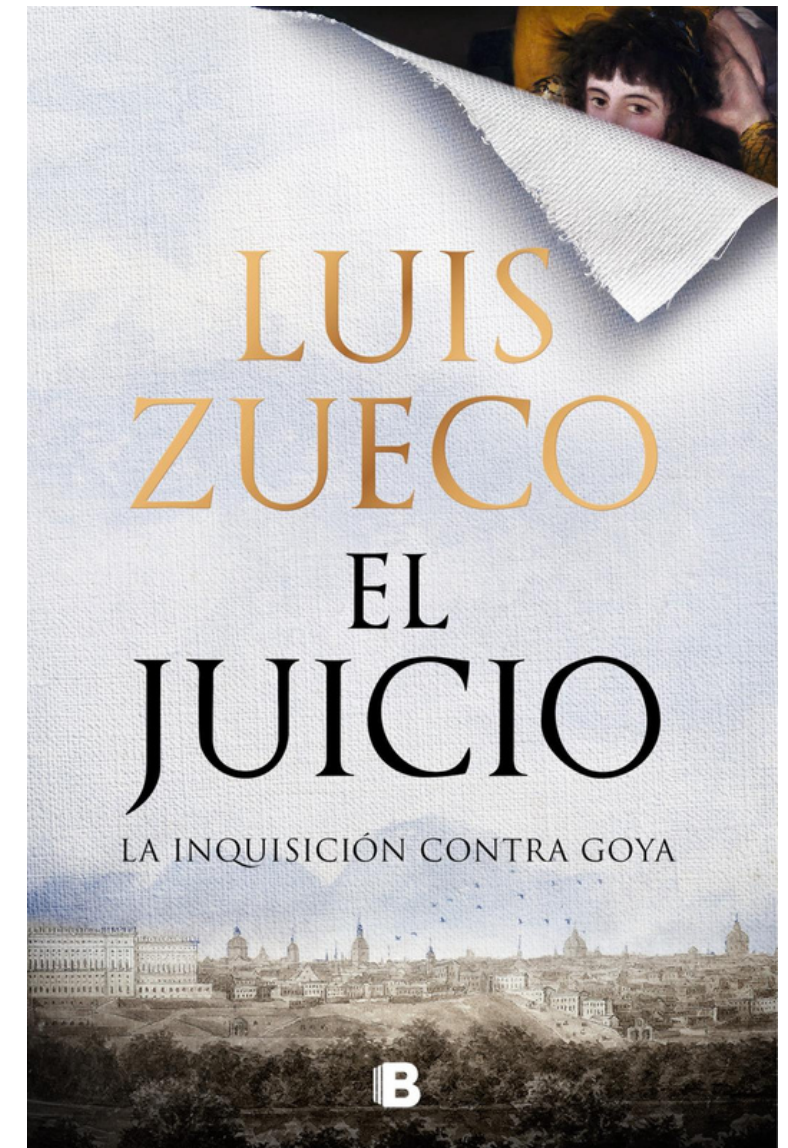
Opposing him stood the Inquisition —an institution in decline, but still feared, capable of destroying lives— and Goya’s work posed a real threat to the regime, especially if it reached Napoleonic France, where revolution had already toppled a monarchy. The danger was real, and Goya knew it.

Through Angélica, a young art lover new to Madrid, we witness Goya’s courage, the vibrant cultural scene of the time, and a fight for freedom in the face of tyranny. This is not just the story of a genius —it’s a powerful tale of how art can challenge power and ignite change.



LUIS ZUECO

Luis Zueco is a novelist, historian, researcher and photographer. At present he is Managing Director of the Castillo de Grisel, a medieval castle turned into a hotel. His novel *The 33rd Step* obtained the honourable mention at the International Award for Historical Novel of Zaragoza in 2012. It also obtained the award for the **best historical thriller in the Historical Novel Festival of Úbeda**. He has achieved international success with his fascinating Medieval Trilogy: *The Castle*, *The City* and *The Monastery*, three novels set in the most important architectural settings of medieval times. He is one of the most important historical novelists in Spanish with more than **500.000 copies sold** and **his books have been translated into Polish, Portuguese and Italian**.

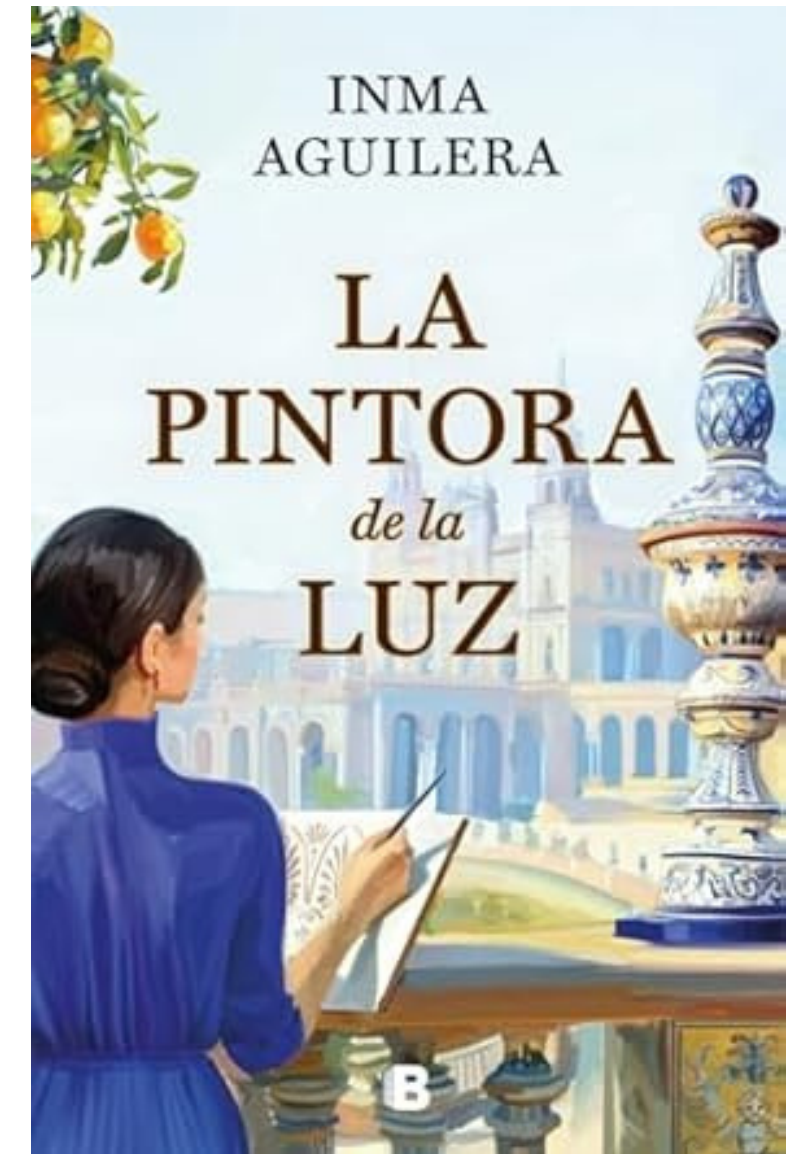

In 2016 she received the XXI Ateneo Joven de Sevilla Novel Prize for the work *El aleteo de la Mariposa* and, four years later, she received a **special mention at the VIII HQÑ International Prize** for *El excéntrico Señor Denet*. With *La Dama de La Cartuja* she inaugurated a new stage in her literary career that earned her recognition for the **Best First Novel Award 2024**. With *The Painter of Light*, the continuation of this exciting historical saga, she is confirmed as one of the most promising names on the publishing scene in our country.
