The construction of the Austrian fort Martinella on the Italian border brings unprecedented prosperity to the inhabitants of the mountain village of Palera. But then one of them disappears mysteriously on the eve of the First World War.

Was he a spy or was he a victim of a crime? When the garrison, a mix from five nations moves into the fort, the village changed again. But the idyll doesn't last long. The war with Italy brought great suffering to the villagers and three of the fortress soldiers died. The inhabitants of Palera and Fort Martinella remained connected to one another in a fateful manner even in the eventful decades after the First World War. Again and again people meet here, who do not let the disappearance of their fellow citizens and the death of the three soldiers rest.



Alexander Zelger tells the story of the everyday life of the head of the criminal investigation department at the police headquarters in Bolzano. The tragic and the comic, the all too human and the murderous, experiences of success and dangerous situations are intermingled. In the description of individual cases, the reader will notice both the seriousness and the humour of the Commissario Capo are equally striking. As A Saboteur to the Brenner Pass





**The partisan adventure of the US agent Roderick Hall
1944/45**

The fate of the US agent who parachutes into northern Italy during the Second World War sometimes bears features of a James Bond film, but is ultimately one of immense tragedy. A 29-year-old adventurous giant who spent several weeks skiing and climbing in the Dolomites as a student in 1937 offers the newly founded American secret service Office of Strategic Services (OSS) to destroy all important north-south supply routes of the German troops on the southern edge of the Alps. A special division is being set up in the OSS to drop daring desperadoes behind enemy lines. They are to support partisans operating against the German troops with information, weapons and explosives. Hall's grand plan is to attack and block the road and rail links over the Brenner Pass.

From August to December 1944, he travels through the province of Belluno with partisans, sometimes carrying out more, sometimes less successful acts of sabotage, but then separates from his fighters in frustration. In January 1945, he set off on skis across the mountains, got caught in a snowstorm, got frostbite on his right foot, and finally collapsed near Cortina. A priest finds him half unconscious in the snow in front of his church. A forestry worker reports the incident to the police, who take Hall to the SS in town. A few days later Hall is taken to the Gestapo in Bolzano. Gestapo chief August Schiffer has his henchmen strangle Hall in the boiler room of the Corpo d'Armata quarters. They hang the body in his cell in such a way that it looks like suicide. Four Gestapo men who were present at the execution stand trial before an American court martial in Naples in early 1946. Three of them are sentenced to death, one aide to life imprisonment. In July 1946, the three murderers are hanged in Livorno.


Village stories about the hard rural life

A farmer's wife and mother of ten children tells of her life, as does a Montecatini worker who was sent to prison on suspicion of having blown up a monument to Mussolini. A man from Kollmann sold rats to the people of Bolzano as squirrels to make money. The same man scraped gunpowder from dropped bombs and sold it. The grape innkeeper Heindl, known throughout the country as an innkeeper and trader, tells of his life, as does Heinrich Kamelger from Villabassa, who was ordained a priest in the Bressanone Cathedral and worked in Barbiano as a parish priest and pastor.

Most of the women were not allowed to learn a profession. Even a hunger strike did not help. One young woman was still not allowed to become a midwife because she was needed on the home farm. An unmarried child grew up with a woman in Saubach and was not even looked at by her mother when they met for the first time.

South Tyrol in the interwar period: 25 incredible life stories, collected by the author, recall a long-forgotten time full of hardship and suffering.

South Tyrolean experiences in the Second World War and the post war period 1943- 1958

The second half of the World War after the surrender of the 6th Army in Stalingrad in February 1943 also brought the war to South Tyrol. Everyday life is increasingly shaped by the worries of daily survival, and this is also reflected in the correspondence between family members who are separated due to the war.

The end of the war in 1945 ultimately brought the end of all illusions of victory for the German Reich, but also, in its wake, the end of any hope of South Tyrol's reincorporation into Austria. This preoccupied many who found themselves outside South Tyrol after 1945 as a result of the option and whose path to the old homeland was now blocked. The letters from soldiers from Allied captivity - from France to the USA - tell stories of survival in a foreign land and of a changing view of South Tyrol's option decisions of 1939, as well as an incipient reflection on their own responsibility.

The turmoil of the post-war period did not end for most of the displaced with the Treaty of Paris of 1946, and the many letters and field postcards attest to a general disorientation of the individual, but also of society as a whole, which has hardly been taken into account in the traditional historiography of the post-war period. The period between 1945 and 1950 is much more multi-faceted than the political dates of the capitulation, the founding of the SVP, the Treaty of Paris, etc. suggest.

This is the subject of this third volume of the trilogy on the social history of South Tyrol in the 20th century, which uses postcards and letters, diary entries and photographs to create a vivid picture of this turbulent and depressing period and shows how individual people organized their survival/life.


South Tyrolean fates under Fascism and National Socialism

This publication examines the traumatic period of forced Italianisation of South Tyrol after Mussolini's rise to power in 1922 and the resettlement option offered by the German Reich and the Kingdom of Italy in 1939 from a hitherto not comprehensively considered point of view: the private correspondence of German-speaking South Tyroleans who, in the face of global political upheaval, tried to steer themselves and their families through these threatening times as unscathed as possible.

The focus on the private sources shows in a way that is as touching as it is depressing the profound inner conflict with which South Tyroleans reacted to the pressure to Italianise and to the option of either becoming homeless Germans after 1939 and thus being at the mercy of the Third Reich's resettlement plans or of continuing to live in their homeland as Italianised South Tyroleans and abandoning their German-speaking culture.

Furthermore, this book deals with the war experiences of young South Tyroleans between 1940 and Stalingrad, the turning point of the war, who, after opting for Germany, were immediately drafted into the Wehrmacht and performed their service for National Socialist Germany on the various war fronts.

With this new approach, the existing history of South Tyrol is decisively enriched by the human experience, which makes the turmoil of the people in their time all the more impressively clear and their decisions more comprehensible.



Committed to my father Ezra Pound

At Samahof in Gais in Puster Valley she was "The Moidele". She grew up there as a foster child because her father was married to another woman and her mother did not want to give up her career as a violinist. The fact that her father's name was Ezra Pound, a famous poet, did not matter to her at that time. Moidele helped Tatte, her foster father, with the stable work; she wanted to become a sheep farmer. In the valley, people thought that God did not understand Italian, so they did not need this language. That changed for Moidile, now called Mary, when she got to know her parents' world: classical music, writers like T. S. Eliot, Ernest Hemingway and Samuel Beckett. During the war, Mary worked as a typist for the German army in a military hospital in Cortina. In Rome she met Boris de Rachewiltz, her future husband. With the Egyptologist, she built a memorial to Ezra Pound on the Brunnenburg. Mary became a writer herself and translated Pound's Cantos into Italian.

With her tips and stories in his luggage, author Helmut Luther travels to cities where her parents and she herself left traces. Everywhere he meets contemporary witnesses who remember Pound, Olga Rudge and the bohemian circles in which they both frequented, the rich artistic and intellectual life in Italy of the time. He visits places immortalised in the Cantos. Pound's opus magnum is ideally suited as a - albeit demanding - travel guide. The author meets fascinating personalities. He meets creative people, fun-loving project realisers, comes across things he would otherwise have passed by. He discovers quiet natural landscapes.

Escape Over The Alps







Special People





Hans Rieder is known for his sensitive written stories about the hard life in the past century in South Tyrol. Contemporary witnesses, mainly from the rural milieu, indicate their bitter needs, their great poverty, their ubiquitous hunger, the misery of war, their troubles of everyday life. For his latest work, the author collected life stories from special people, "Bsundra Leit", with memories and episodes from their lives. They do great things on their farms, organize their lives under simple conditions, pursue the hard life of farmers and endure their fate. Poverty, hard day-to-day work are part of their everyday life and they learn to live with it. But "Special People" are also people who break out of their usual way of life because of their lifestyle and thus provide additional topics for conversation in the villages. Often it is a matter of cheerful episodes that are continued for a long time. They all have one thing in common: strong roots in the courtyards, the home valley and the modest means that have to be worked out every day. So the actors continue to live with their life stories in the vernacular. There remain the stories of people who are popularly referred to as "Bsundra Leit".

Silent Victims

Much of the historical facts and horrific things that have happened between the First and Second World Wars have been made generally and permanently accessible through numerous scientific works and publications in recent years. Nevertheless, a lot remained and remains hidden. Many dark and painful chapters of the tearing of Tyrol, the hate against everything Austrian, the extermination of the South Tyrolean folk culture planned since 1918, option and resettlement of the South Tyrolean and other fascist and swastika, but also Red Guardian crimes have been transfigured or hidden. Günther Rauch, one of the best connoisseurs of the black and brown years in South Tyrol, uses the unequal and shattering path of life of the Valentinotti siblings from Bolzano to trace the serious wounds that two world wars and dictatorships tore open in the southern Alps. Terrible things happened to three of the seven Valentinotti siblings. Karl Valentinotti, imperial hunter and eldest brother, has been recorded as a trading agent by the Italian black shirts since 1923 in a list of around 500 "subversive Pangermanist elements" and is constantly shadowed by the secret services. In 1944, Maria and Stefan Valentinotti were tortured and murdered because of their South Tyrolean existence. Midi was desecrated by Stalinist-communist partisans and shot on a potato field in Zopodn. Her brother Stefan, a late Russian returnee from the First World War and a staunch supporter of Hitler and Mussolini and a passionate supporter of a "Free State of South Tyrol", learned of this in a letter from his wife in the fascist prison in Brandenburg-Görden a few days before his execution with the Fall ax by the National Socialists. This book, based on years of research and real events, also gives a unique and realistic insight into the tragedies that took place in Tyrol and Europe from 1914 to 1945. The consequences can still be seen today.
